The Problem: Lack of skilled talent

- One of the biggest concerns in Muskegon is the lack of skilled talent for a growing jobs market.*
- Currently 53% of job postings require a license/certificate, associate degree, or a bachelor's degree.*
- By 2025, this number is projected to rise to 64%.**
- Of Muskegon's workforce (age 25-64), only 35.4% have these types of post high school degrees.***
- "Aging out" occupations are at risk. Baby Boomers are retiring, Millennials AND New Gens will fill the gaps.****

One Solution: The Muskegon Area Promise. What is it?

- A post high school scholarship that provides the financial assistance necessary to obtain a two-year degree or its equivalent when used in conjunction with federal, state and/or institutional grants.
- Operated and managed by a designated statewide Promise Zone in partnership with Muskegon Community College and Baker College of Muskegon.
- Opportunity for ALL students with a 3.5 GPA who live in & graduate from a qualifying high school located within MAISD boundaries.

Promise Zones established

- In 2009 state law approved 10 Promise Zones.
 (Muskegon Area, Baldwin, Battle Creek, Benton Harbor, Detroit, Hazel Park, Jackson, Pontiac, Lansing, Saginaw)
- Why? To expand educational opportunities by providing scholarships to students, build a skill-based workforce, and transform communities.
- Muskegon County was the FIRST and ONLY regional Promise Zone serving more than one school district.
- In recent years, Jackson lost its designation as a Zone. In its place, Newaygo County RESA has been added, and is now the SECOND regional Promise Zone.
- Most recently, in November 2017, our state Governor signed into law expansion of the Promise Zones from 10 to 15.

How does the Muskegon Area Promise work?

- Legally governed by a Promise Zone Authority Board.
- The Promise Zone legislation defines that for the first two years, scholarships must be funded with private contributions.
- Thereafter, a Promise Zone can capture HALF of the revenue growth from the regional state education tax leading to a self-funding model.

Promise Eligibility Requirements

Two Years of Free College

Our Promise. Your Future.



LIVE within the boundaries of the Muskegon Area Intermediate School District (MAISD).



APPLY for federal student aid using the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and complete the verification process as requested each year (www.fafsa.gov).



GRADUATE with a cumulative 3.5 GPA or higher from a high school located within the boundaries of the MAISD.



ENROLL at either Muskegon Community College or Baker College of Muskegon.

No scholarship application is needed for the **PROMISE** award. Rather, students will be notified with a letter of eligibility and asked to accept the award in writing each spring.

Students must successfully complete their coursework to maintain eligibility. Each college's Satisfactory Academic Progress policies apply.

Recent Scholars by the Numbers... What we know



443 Promise Scholars were enrolled in college locally for the 2019/20 terms

413 - Muskegon Community College

30 - Baker College of Muskegon

\$3,818 is the average Promise Award paid on behalf of our students

20% of all Promise Scholars are fully funded with other resources such as PELL, and TIP

10% of all Promise Scholars have MACTC experience

35% of Promise Scholars are interested/enrolled in programs leading to a career in Health Sciences. The remaining top choices are General Studies (26%) and Education/Human Service (14%)

80% of all Promise Scholars have disclosed plans to transfer to a university or pursue a Bachelor's Degree

480 new graduates in 2020 were identified as Promise eligible

89% of all 2019 Promise eligible graduates are returning to college locally in 2020/21

How will we advise our students? Purposeful Communication:

- Target and Advise Junior and Senior level students
- Monitor and advise students with a 3.5 GPA and higher
- Intense advising for students with a 3.00-3.49 GPA. Appeal Applications are available for students with weighted GPA calculations.
- Advise Schools of Choice students of eligibility (full scholarships are for those students attending area high schools for 4 full years. All others will have a prorated amount.)
- Advise transitioning Middle School students
- "Dream Big" Marketing and Promotions, K-12

How will we advise our students? Notification of Award:

- Guidance Counselors and College Advisers are recommended to continually work to monitor all students' college plans and GPA's.
- <u>No application</u> is needed for the PROMISE award. Rather, students will be notified with an official letter of eligibility and asked to accept the award in writing each Spring.
- Release and Permissions <u>annually</u> is required. Online Acceptance via Google as the source. Acceptance will need to be complete by July 1 <u>annually</u>.

The bottom line...nuts and bolts

- Promise eligibility is based on student's unweighted GPA. Appeals may be submitted for weighted GPA's at or above the 3.5 cut-off. Official Pro-Forma applications are required.
- Students must be "degree seeking" declared students at either institution, not "guest students".
- Students must successfully complete their college coursework to maintain eligibility. Each college's Satisfactory Academic Progress policies apply.
- All scholarships expire, and be forfeited, after four years after high school graduation.
- The scholarship is a last dollar award. Any unused money will stay in our investment accounts to benefit future Promise Scholars.
- Release and Permissions <u>annually</u> is required. Online Acceptance via Google as the source.
 Acceptance will need to be complete by July 1 <u>annually</u>.

The bottom line...what FREE really means

• The value of the scholarship increases with the prevailing rate and costs of our local Community College. The amount of the Promise scholarship may be adjusted each year based on any revised student financial aid and/or trend data statistics. The 2020/21 Award includes: Tuition and fees for up to 31 credits per year, as well ONE additional contact hour and fee per year as needed. 62 credits, the equivalent of an Associate Degree, is the maximum amount covered. Note: Prevailing rates (dollar amount) will be released annually in the spring.

A college course load example:

Year 1 - Fall 12 credits, Winter 12 credits, Summer 7 credits = 31 credits Year 2 - Fall 15 credits, Winter 16 credits, Summer 0 credit = 31 credits

62 credits in total leading to an AA degree and/or transfer

- Fees for exploratory classes such as study abroad *may not be* covered by the Promise award. Students should confirm the allowance with Financial Aid prior to enrolling.
- Educational expenses such as books, supplies and equipment needed while enrolled in college; are only available in partnership with other secured funds, grants, awards or scholarships.
- The value of the scholarship is based on "in county" tuition rates at our local Community College. In the event
 a students residence is out of county (Ottawa, Newaygo or Oceana) higher rates will be charged. This
 difference/deficit is currently not covered by the Promise award.

Magic Number.... 62

It is assumed 62 college credits in most cases should meet the equivalency of an AA degree.

Some students may become Promise Scholars having earned FREE college credits through Dual Enrollment, AP, CTC or Early College. These credits could result in a reduction of the 62 maximum allowance.

Our primary goal is a path to a degree, not simply just 62 credits.

- 3 credits earned from Dual Enrollment? Result = 59 remaining credits paid for by the Promise.
- 6 credits earned from an AP test score? Result = 56 remaining remaining credits paid for by the Promise.
- 58 credits earned from EC? Result = 4 remaining credits paid for by the Promise.

Note: There may be exceptions and programs of study that would not fit or confirm these assumptions. If Promise Scholars have not finished all credits needed for an AA degree, they may be considered for additional Promise dollars in an effort to complete any remaining credits needed. An Appeal Application to our Promise Board is required for consideration for any such circumstance.

Myth versus Fact?

MI Opportunity Scholarship

Governor Whitmer announced a new statewide goal to increase the number of Michiganders with a postsecondary credential (a high-quality industry certificate, associate degree or higher) to 60% by 2030.

The proposed Michigan Opportunity Scholarship will play a large role in helping Michigan residents reach this goal!

This new proposed scholarship offers two paths to help graduating high school students obtain a postsecondary credential.

- Path I provides graduating high school students with two years of tuition-free postsecondary education at a community college. This program is again modeled on a successful bipartisan program in Tennessee that seeks to address the expected skills gap and fill the workforce needs of businesses in the state.
- Path II provides two years of tuition assistance at a public or not-for-profit four-year university for students demonstrating financial need.

This new effort, if passed into law, will work in tandem with the (15) Promise Zones across our entire state resulting in more options for students, more flexibility for local Promise Scholarships. The resources unlocked by the new state scholarship will allow each PZA to more fully address the higher education needs of all the students in our communities.

Financial Responsibility

ALL Scholars are urged to be **financially responsible** with their awards, regardless of the source. Students are encouraged to:

- Meet all Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) standards and expectations.
- Monitor annual credit accumulation and plan for necessary adjustments.
- Attend orientation sessions planned by colleges (Promise 101 Information Night, New Student Orientation, MCC's Jayhawk Journey and/or Baker's BC Student Orientation).
- Maintain residency in-county to receive discounted rates.
- Meet often with College Counselors and/or OneStop Advisers to ensure programs of study are on track.
- Apply for, seek, or save other financial resources to assist in any unforeseen costs.

Student Success: Promise Zone Mandate

Beginning with the 2016-2017 academic year, students who receive financial assistance from the Muskegon Area Promise Zone will be required to provide the Promise Zone with access to the information needed to comply with the requirements of Public Act 9 of 2016. Reports submitted to the Michigan Department of Treasury will need to include minimum data including:

The number of students who received financial assistance from the Promise Zone during the prior academic year

The number of these students who successfully completed a certificate program, an associate degree or a bachelor's degree during the prior academic year

The number of the students who withdrew from their classes during the prior academic year

For those students who have completed 24 or more semester credits during the prior academic year, the average time required to complete the equivalent of 24 semester credits

The six year post secondary graduation rate for those students who received financial assistance from the Promise Zone subsequent to the adoption of Public Act 9 of 2016
